It is expected that EPPO will have to establish similar links with supervisory authorities.

This arrangement outlines the conditions for the close cooperation by which this can occur, in full respect of the respective mandates of the EPPO and the Court.

The EPPO signed a working arrangement on 13 September 2021 with the Italian General Prosecutor's Office of the Court of Auditors aiming to provide a structured framework for cooperation and to establish and maintain a cooperative relationship between them.

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<sup>1</sup> The PCTO project (commonly known as school-work alternance) is an educational method designed to allow high school students to combine the mostly theoretical scholastic education with a practical work experience within a private or public entity. PCTO implies periods of professional formation in enterprises or other activities that may strengthen the students' integration into the labour market (i.e. orientation days, meetings with companies and professionals, internships, research, project work etc.). The alternance has been made mandatory since 2015.
